A LETTER FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

LORÉN M. SPEARS, NARRAGANSETT

Asco Weequasin 2022 was a pivotal year following COVID isolation, giving us an opportunity to build upon our expanded virtual programs and reengage our visitors in-person through programs and public events.

This year also marked the beginning of special projects such as the Indigenous Veterans Monument, a major period of staff growth and development, and a ramping up of fundraising to build a New Museum Campus.

In this 2022 year, 11,932 people were directly impacted in-person by Tomaquag on and offsite through Museum visits, our Educational Programs and Public Events. In addition, when you include social media, E-news, our Annual Honoring Event, and special events or programs for the Indigenous Community through Tomaquag's Indigenous Empowerment Center, we reached 164,481 people (some multiple times) in 2022.

We are so grateful to the Papitto Foundation for their generous grant of \$457, 983 showing confidence and support and enabling Tomaquag to grow steadily as an Indigenous-led organization.

In addition, we received a whopping \$1 million grant from the Champlin Foundation for the New Museum! With that generous gift, we raised \$1,318,417 toward the new museum in 2022.

Many thanks to our Board volunteers for sharing their time and talents, our administrators, hardworking staff, and partners in the community who advocated for Tomaquag Museum. Thank you to the 15 museum volunteers and unpaid interns, without whom we could not achieve so much. Kutaputush.

Looking ahead to 2023, we will continue to refine departmental roles and goals with a new three-year strategic plan, and work on fundraising for both general operations and the New Museum and increase involvement from elders and experts as we meet to consider the content and design for future exhibits. Thanks to our donors, advocates, partners and collaborators, we are feeling blessed and looking forward to a bright 2023.

SPECIAL PROJECTS

Stolen Relations: Recovering Stories of Indigenous Enslavement in the

Americas Housed by Brown University, Tomaquag became a partner of this project to build a database to understand and research the displacement and enslavement of Indigenous peoples during settler colonialism.

Re-Imagining New England

Histories In collaboration with Mystic Aquarium and Brown University, Tomaquag worked to create exhibits, publications, and curriculum to acknowledge the hidden histories of Indigenous and Black peoples of New England.

RI Center for the Book This year, Lorén was an Honorary Chair, celebrating Fire Keeper's Daughter by Angeline Boulley (Chippewa). In 2022, the Honoring Indigenous Veterans monument project, to be built by the end of 2023 at the RI Veterans Memorial Cemetery, had **raised over \$65,000**. The monument is to recognize the valor and sacrifices of Indigenous Veterans in the United States Armed Forces who are interred within the Rhode Island Veterans Memorial Cemetery.



Lorén and Silvermoon attended the Association of Tribal Archives, Libraries, and Museums conference in California in October, where Lorén received the 2022

Leadership Award and Silvermoon received a scholarship.



In 2022 the planning for Tomaquag's New Museum made many advancements. New staff was hired to help with the project, including an Executive Assistant and a Development Assistant. A Capital Campaign Consultant was brought onboard, as well as a grant

writer, and Libby Slader Interior Designs, PROUN Exhibit Design, and Keough Construction Project Management were all selected to begin the designing and planning of the New Museum Campus.

Established in 2016, Tomaquag's Indigenous Empowerment Center (IEC) strives to eradicate poverty in the Indigenous Community of Rhode Island through education, cultural competency, job training, employment, small business incubation, addressing social justice, and building equity through 'Tomaquag Museum and our ever-expanding network of partners. As the Indigenous Empowerment Manager, Samantha's role is to help facilitate relationships, through museum partnerships that create a catalyst for economic change within the Native Community of Rhode Island. These partnerships focus on the various areas of interest in the community, including theater, community-led initiatives, education, business development, entrepreneurship, and many others. The creation of IEC was a calling for her to get back into the workforce and make a meaningful difference in her community through a social justice and activism lens.



Crafts Act were completed.









ARCHIVES & COLLECTIONS



Anthony Belz Archivist & Collections Manager

The Tomaquag Museum Archival Collection is dedicated to acquiring and preserving cultural materials of historical significance specifically related to Indigenous culture, history, storytelling, ecology, politics and sovereignty. The archive focuses on the Indigenous people of the Northeast United States and Southern New England, primarily the Narragansett/Niantic people, but the museum also collects relevant materials related to Indigenous people throughout the Western Hemisphere. The Archive contains over 100,000 physical items which encompass a wide variety of materials and resources, as well as individual collections. These individual collections include: original, primary documents such as correspondence, business records, photographs, artwork, scrapbooks, newspaper clippings, language resources, oral history recordings, audiovisual materials, a small reference library and rapidly growing collection of digital assets.



Transcription of text and index of the **Narragansett Dawn** was completed. The Narragansett Dawn was a monthly newspaper from 1935 - 1936, founded by Princess Red Wing and Ernest Hazard that discussed the culture, politics, religion, history, and language of the Narragansett Tribe.



In 2022, the collections & archive team inventoried all museum belongings. Inventory of museum belongings was completed in the spring with a total of 1,000 belongings. Inventory of the collections storage was completed in the summer, and the remaining inventory in the fall. In total, **8,736 belongings** were inventoried.



Tomaquag's Media team records all videos and photos for all of our events and programs such as the Annual Honoring, Indigenous Veterans Monument celebrations, Strawberry and Cranberry Thanksgivings and Nikommo, video messages to donors, promo videos, social media, and more. They run our social media accounts and create the weekly e-mail newsletter.

Language with Lynsea: A bi-weekly language revitalizing series comprised of 2-minute episodes teaching viewers the Narragansett language. Taught by IEC Coordinator, Lynsea Montanari. So far, there are 22 episodes uploaded and 14 episodes have premiered.

Impact Stories: A docuseries featuring members of the Indigenous community who have participated in Tomaquag Museum's Indigenous Empowerment Center, sharing how their experiences with the program helped them grow, both professionally and personally.



Sessions with Elders: With new camera and sound equipment, Tony, Lorén and Chloe have been recording the Elders of the Tribe during their identification sessions. They take and archive all photos, videos and audio recordings.







OUTSIDE COLLABORATIONS

Members of the Hopkinton Historical Society reached out to our Media team to take photos to help them grow their online presence. They are interested collaborating with Tomaquag Museum to highlight Indigenous culture/ influence in Hopkinton.

In Summer 2022, Chloe interviewed and filmed students participating in Shark Camp hosted by URI. She also photographed students as they had this vibrant and unique learning experience.

Stepping Into The Shade: Chloe is currently working on a docuseries with two professors from Eastern Connecticut State University with a focus on Tobacco Migrant workers and how working on Tobacco farms help increase the the minority population in CT. They wanted the Indigenous perspective on the history of Tobacco, and featured Lorén in their series.










Overall, **321,146** weekly newsletter emails were sent out to our list of subscribers.

Fundraising appeals, such as 401Gives, are led by the Development Department. In 2022, we raised \$12,375 donations which help us to continue to spread the Indigenous Perspective firsthand from staff and interns, such as Haley, pictured above.

Tomaquag's Development Department is responsible for the fund development of the museum. This includes database and contact management as well as tracking of all donations and development funds. As part of keeping close relationships with donors and patrons, they are responsible for stewardship including cards, thank you letters, written correspondence, phone calls, gifts, and more. They also organize and promote appeals, such as 401Gives, Giving Tuesday, and the Annual Appeal, and planning of the Annual Honoring & Cultural Celebration. They handle communications such as newsletters and outreach, marketing and social media posts for events and fundraising, maintain the GuideStar profile, and conduct grant research.

Tomaquag's Finance department is responsible for reconciling all finances, grants, statements, income, expenses, and money management. Finance also reports on grant expenditures, and ensures administration and allocation of grant funds to proper accounts. Finance and Development work closely to ensure all donated income is allocated to the correct accounts and funds. Together, they handle all revenue and reporting for the Tomaquag Museum on a daily basis.


Every year the Tomaquag Museum gathers with its friends, families, and community for its Honoring & Cultural Celebration where we **honor** individuals and organizations who have made an impact for the greater good in the Native Community. In 2022, we honored Ramona Peters (Mashpee Wampanoag) the Papitto Opportunity Connection, Mashantucket Pequot Sugar, Chris Newell (Passamaquoddy), Christine DeLucia, Ph.D., and Kali Reis (Seaconke Wampanoag).

The Honoring & Cultural Celebration is Tomaquag Museum's only fundraising event for the year. In 2022, we raised \$46,828 with a net of \$33,174 for educational programs, children's story hours, and more. Over 170 people attended the event- the most ever! 2022 marked the return of the event in-person after having held it virtually in 2020 and 2021.






YEAR IN REVIEW 2022 - FUND DEVELOPMENT


